MINTES OF CITY COUNCIL MEETING
CITY OF NEW CARROLTON
APRIL 7, 1999

The regularly scheduled meeting of the City Council of the City of New Carrollton was held in the New Carrollton Municipal Center on Wednesday, April 7, 1999.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Raymond J. Garvey. Present were Council Members James H. Fippin, Rose M. Hurdle, Sarah C. Potter, and John A. Schaffer; Mayor Andrew C. Hanko, Administrative Officer Mark L. Latour, Public Works Director Richard L. Robbins, and Treasurer Duane Rosenberg.

1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Chairman Garvey asked Council Member Fippin to lead the Pledge of Allegiance tonight.

2. REPORT OF THE MAYOR.

Mayor Hanko reported that he submitted the proposed budget for F.Y. 2000 to the City Council on April 1, and he then read the letter attached to the budget. The Council would begin reviewing the budget at the next Council workshop on April 19, and there would be public hearings in May. It is possible that the budget might be adopted the first week of June, and copies are available at the New Carrollton Library and at City Hall.

The Mayor reported that the City would host a business meeting tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m. at the Municipal Center. All business owners in the City are invited to attend.

Mayor Hanko reported that individuals and groups of teenagers are congregating on residents' property and in some locations of the City, sometimes causing an inconvenience to residents and vehicle traffic. The Mayor recommended to residents that they may call City Hall about this problem, and a City Contract Officer would be dispatched. If there is an emergency, Mayor Hanko urged residents to please call 911. City Contract Officers have been made aware of some of the problem areas, and they will monitor those locations on a daily basis.

Mayor Hanko explained about the "Watch Your Car" program, and he stated that he had been authorized to install two decals, which he proudly displayed, on the vehicles of residents who come to City Hall to fill out the forms to participate in the program. The Mayor reviewed some of the information required on the forms, and he explained that the

forms must be filled out in his presence. The Mayor would install the decals at City Hall, and no decals would be issued to residents. For additional information about when the Mayor would be in the office, please call City Hall at (301) 459-6100.

Mayor Hanko reported that there would be a special meeting of the Men's Club at City Hall on Friday, April 9th, at 8:00 p.m. Both male and female residents of New Carrollton, 21 years old and older, are invited to attend and, hopefully, join the newly organized club.

The Brotherly Love organization located at Carrollton Mall would hold a special open house and ceremony from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m., this Saturday. This organization is dedicated to helping school age children, and Mayor Hanko stated that all residents are invited to attend.

Mayor Hanko reported that the New Carrollton Garden Club would celebrate their 40th anniversary on Saturday, April 17, at 9:00 a.m. The event would begin with a lecture on floral arrangements, and all residents are invited and encouraged to attend.

Mayor Hanko reminded the residents that the annual spaghetti dinner hosted by the Vera Cope Weinbach Scholarship Committee would be held at City Hall on Saturday, April 24, from 4:30 to 8:00 p.m. Proceeds go to scholarships for deserving young residents, and the Mayor urged everyone to attend. For additional information about tickets, please call (301) 577-3197. There would also be an open house at City Hall the same day; and at this time, residents would have the opportunity to tour the City offices and Council chamber.

Council Member Schaffer asked about the dates for Municipal Government Week, and Mayor Hanko responded that packets have already been sent to local schools. The event would begin the week of April 17, and the Mayor is waiting to hear from the schools.

Council Member Fippin referred to the Mayor's announcement regarding the Vera Cope Weinbach Scholarship Committee's annual spaghetti dinner, and he commended their chairman, Mr. Bob Kraft, for the fine job he is doing.

Mr. Fippin commented that the City election would be held on Monday, May 3; and since this is the regular date for the Council workshop, Mayor Hanko explained that the workshop would be held on Tuesday, May 4.

At this time, Mayor Hanko took the opportunity to congratulate the incumbents who were running for the City Council.

Council Member Hurdle asked about the date for the Brotherly Love event, and the Mayor responded that it would be held this Saturday at 12:30 p.m.

Mrs. Hurdle thanked Public Works Director Robbins for the assistance he provided two City residents last week.

Mrs. Hurdle reported that she has received reports about speeding in the City, cars passing on the right, and not stopping at stop signs. This activity has occurred in the area of Verona Drive, and Mrs. Hurdle is concerned about the little children playing on the sidewalks now that the weather is nice. Mayor Hanko asked Mrs. Hurdle to get the tag numbers of the vehicles the next time this happens, because this might help the police to make a positive identification.

Chairman Garvey took this opportunity to thank Mr. Robbins and the Public Works employees for the excellent job done in cleaning up in the area around Inlet Street.

Mr. Garvey commented on Mrs. Hurdle's statement about the speeding in the City, and he explained that he had observed police cruisers in the area of Westbrook Drive setting up for radar detection.

3. REPORT OF THE TREASURER.

Treasurer Rosenberg reported that the City had 79 checks, and they totaled \$47,111.77. Mr. Rosenberg had reviewed the invoices, and he recommended that they be approved for payment. Council Member Potter, based on the recommendation of the Treasurer, moved that the bills be paid; and a copy be attached to the minutes of tonight's meeting. Council Member Fippin seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

4. CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF THE MARCH 15, 1999, COUNCIL WORKSHOP MEETING.

Council Member Hurdle moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Council Member Schaffer seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF THE MARCH 17, 1999, COUNCIL METING.

Council Member Potter moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF THE MARCH 22, 1999, SPECIAL COUNCIL WORKSHOP MEETING.

Council Member Hurdle moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Council Member Potter seconded the motion. Mrs. Potter stated that it should be noted that the purpose of the special workshop was strictly to work on the ballot question for the May 3rd election, regarding the police. Chairman Garvey then called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously (5-0) approved.

- 5. PUBLIC HEARING-ON PROPOSED ORDINANCE NO. 99-04 TO ENACT A NEW SECTION 110-75, SCHEDULE XXVII, ENTITLED "RESTRICTED WEEKEND PARKING," OF CHAPTER 110 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW CARROLLTON, MARYLAND, 1997 EDITION, ENTITLED "VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC" FOR THE PURPOSE OF RESTRICTING WEEKEND PARKING ON CERTAIN STREETS EXCEPT BY PERMIT PARKING FOR RESIDENTS AS PROVIDED FOR IN RESOLUTION 98-01 OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEW CARROLLTON, MARYLAND.**

Chairman Garvey explained that no telephone calls could be received, and all testimony tonight must be in person. Mr. Latour stated that the City had received no written testimony, and there was no testimony from the audience. Therefore, the Chairman declared the public hearing held.

6. REPORTS OF THE COUNCIL.

Council Member Potter commented on the town meeting held last week, and she stated that she felt it was very informative. Mrs. Potter commended the Mayor for having the meeting, and she felt that the police officers in attendance were taking notes so that they could get back to the citizens with responses to their concerns. Mrs. Potter felt that there was a good turnout, and there was a good representation of the Prince George's County Police.

Mrs. Potter commented on the Easter egg hunt at the Vera Cope Weinbach Park; and she commended the workers who worked on this event, that was sponsored by the Men's Club. There was a good turnout, and the Easter bunny made an appearance.

Council Member Schaffer commented on his report at the last Council meeting, when he stated that Spring is coming. Now Spring is here, and the Bradford pear trees are beautiful. Mr. Schaffer commended Mr. Robbins and the employees at Public Works for the work that they do to keep the City looking its best.

Council Member Schaffer explained that this has been a very busy time for the City Council, and he commented on the World War II Veterans' luncheon. Mr. Schaffer also commented on the town meeting reported on earlier by Mrs. Potter, and he agreed with Mrs. Potter that it was a very good meeting. The residents expressed their concerns about issues, and there was a case brought up at that meeting concerning a youth walking down Vicar Street carrying a handgun. Several cruisers were dispatched to the area, including the three City Contract Police Officers; and arrests were made and the gun, which turned out to be a pellet gun, was confiscated. Mr. Schaffer commended the neighbor who was thoughtful enough to call the police, and he stated that this is an example of how Neighborhood Watch works.

Mr. Schaffer reported that he had the opportunity to have breakfast with and hear a presentation by County Council Member Audrey Scott. Ms. Scott spoke about the budget, which ended up with a twelve-million-dollar surplus this year. Ms. Scott made a motion that that money be paid back to the citizens and the taxpayers, but she was unable to get a second. The other Council Members were not interested.

Back in 1995 the County Council had voted to lower the piggy-back tax from 60% down to 50 % over a five-year period; however, when the Council found that they were faced with a huge deficit, they put that aside. Seventeen percent of what the County gets back goes to the municipalities, and there is a line item in the City's budget that shows income tax. The State reduced their taxes this year by 2.5 percent; however, they held the counties to be harmless. There is a formula in Prince George's County that determines that the tax is actually between 63% and 70%, depending upon the wages. Ms. Scott claimed that the lower wage earner would more likely be paying an extra 70% as opposed to the 63%.

Mr. Schaffer stated that he learned that the libraries would be getting the two million dollars that the State allocated in the last four years. There are plans to renovate the libraries, and the Bowie library has already been done. The next library on the renovation list is the New Carrollton Library, and Schaffer spoke with Mrs. Thrasher this morning about this. The New Carrollton Library is not getting any more money in the budget than they had; however, they are expecting to get new carpeting, furniture, and lighting.

The police department is being well-funded this time, and the County has 1,400 police officers. There is a formula that shows how many police officers there should be for a given population. The population in Prince George's County is about 750,000, and 1,400 police officers is the optimum number necessary for that population. Crime is down in all categories this year, except homicides. According to Ms. Scott, all of those homicides were drug related.

The fire department for the last four years has been understaffed; and this is because four years ago there were seven firemen that filed a reverse discrimination suit. This action locked up the fire department so that they could not hire for four years. The federal court is now in charge of hiring, and the plan must be submitted to the federal court. Now that this situation is alleviated, by next year the fire department would be brought up to speed.

In regard to the schools, Mr. Schaffer learned that over the next ten years there would be over 26 schools built in the County. During the past administration many temporary buildings were erected; and once the busing is finally ended and children could attend their neighborhood schools, then the school system could get rid of those temporary buildings.

Council Member Schaffer reported that he would be on the agenda Thursday evening at the School Board meeting to tell the Board about the fine job that Principal Rise Gaines is doing at Carrollton Elementary School. The teachers have a lot of respect for her, and they demonstrate this with their support. Mr. Schaffer summarized his report by stating that Principal Gaines is a real educator in Prince George's County; and if there were any awards available, she certainly deserves one.

Chairman Garvey mentioned that Mr. Schaffer could have put this item on the agenda at the Monday night workshop; and he suggested that Council Member Schaffer add this item to the agenda tonight. Mr. Schaffer responded that he would do so.

Chairman Garvey stated that the School Board meetings mentioned by Mr. Schaffer are televised on cable television channel B-12, and he asked Mr. Schaffer if the meetings are recorded live. Mr. Schaffer responded that the meetings are live, and Chairman Garvey stated that Channel B-15 is the cable television channel used to broadcast the County Council meetings.

Council Member Fippin reported that the Council had just completed the very strenuous exercise to provide a question for the election on May 3rd on the police issue, and he thanked residents like Mr. Dave Anderson who attended the workshop. This testimony helps the Council, and it is necessary for additional residents to present their views in a Christian atmosphere. These views should be presented to determine if they bear merit, and Mr. Fippin stated that he was happy to be a part of this worthwhile project.

Council Member Hurdle reported about an incident that happened in the City on Madison Street. A large Rottweiler dog running loose attacked a small boarder collie dog on a leash held by its owner. The owner of the larger dog eventually confined the animal, but the smaller dog was injured and treated. There was much confusion about the incident,

and when the resident called the police, the dispatch person mistakenly reported that there was a dog chasing a car. This is a low-priority incident, and there was no response. Eventually the County beat officers showed up and took reports. Fortunately, the larger dog had been vaccinated, and the owners informed the owner of the smaller dog that they would pay for its medical bills.

Mrs. Hurdle explained that she is concerned about this situation, because many children are playing on the streets. Mrs. Hurdle contacted the Animal Control people and County Council Member Tom Hendershot's office about this. Mrs. Hurdle mentioned that there was some legislation three or four years ago regarding pit-bull dogs; and for some reason, Rottweiler dogs were not included in the bill.

Mrs. Hurdle reported that this item would be discussed at a future City Council workshop, and she mentioned that she was sent information from the Animal Management Division. Only human bites are recorded, and from July 3, 1998, to December 23, 1998, there were 33 people in Prince George's County bitten by Rottweiler dogs. There are bills such as CB-106 and CB-104, and Mrs. Hurdle stated that she would pass this information along to the administration to put on the agenda. This is a very serious matter, and residents are urged to call 911 immediately upon observing this type of incident.

Council Member Hurdle mentioned an incident involving a German shepherd dog being walked by its owner. The owner carried the leash, which was not attached to the animal; and the dog chased a man who was walking across Westfield by himself. Mr. and Mrs. Hurdle observed the incident, and they felt very helpless at being unable to assist the man.

Council Member Hurdle reported that the plans for the post office branch that was planned for the Glenridge shopping center fell through, because of insufficient information provided by the owner of the shopping center. Mrs. Hurdle asked the Mayor and Council if meetings with City officials could be set up immediately inviting Congressman Hoyer, Senator Pinsky, County Executive Curry, County Council Member Hendershot, Postmaster Larry Hoeck, and all of the other postal officials.

The purpose of the meeting would be to discuss how to get this post office branch located in the City of New Carrollton, and perhaps the officials of the Internal Revenue Service at the New Carrollton Federal Building could also join the meeting. Although there would be no taxes received by the City from the post office branch, it would mean prestige for the City. The branch must be located in the zip code area 20784 on Annapolis Road-Route 450, and Mrs. Hurdle requested that the Mayor prepare a letter to Mr. Hoeck.

Mrs. Hurdle thanked Public Works Director Robbins and his employees for the good job they did on the stone work on the sign on 85th Avenue.

Mrs. Hurdle commented on the excellent town meeting with Chief Farrell, and she stated that she is saddened to learn that he might be leaving Prince George's County.

Council Member Hurdle reported about the Motor Vehicle Administration hotline that targets out-of-state tags. This is a toll-free telephone hotline for neighbors to report residents who have not registered their vehicles with the State.

Mrs. Hurdle commented on the Men's Club, and she stated that she planned to join the club now that it is open to the ladies in the City. Mrs. Hurdle spoke with Mr. Anderson, who wrote an article for the City Newsletter, and she asked him if she could use this in her news column. Mr. Anderson stated that he approved of this, and Mrs. Hurdle thanked Mr. Anderson for attending the meeting and presenting his proposal to the City Council.

Chairman Garvey followed up on Mr. Schaffer's report about the pear trees in the City, and he asked that residents observe the pear trees on Lamont Drive from the direction of Good Luck Road. The trees are so full that the branches almost touch, and this is a very pretty scene.

Mr. Garvey commented on the Mayor's budget, and he explained that the Council needs input from the residents. This would make the Council's job easier, and help is appreciated. Mr. Garvey discussed the proposed tax increase, and he stated that he hoped that this would not happen.

7. ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA BY THE COUNCIL.

**8. SUSPENSION OF THE RULES IN ORDER TO HEAR FROM CITIZENS
- 10 MINUTE LIMIT.**

A. AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION.

There was no audience participation at this time.

B. TELEPHONE PARTICIPATION.

There were no telephone calls at this time.

At this time, Chairman Garvey explained that the regular camera crew was reduced to two members tonight because of several emergencies. Mr. Garvey commended the crew for doing a "super" job.

9. UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Item No. 0399-01 Proposed Budget Amendment-Chapter CE-99 (Current Expense Budget for F.Y. 1999) Amendment No. 10.

Council Member Potter moved that this item remain on the table. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to remain on the table.

Item No. 0399-02 Proposed Budget Amendment-Chapter CE-99 (Current Expense Budget for F.Y. 1999) Amendment No. 11.

Council Member Fippin moved that this item remain on the table for future discussion. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to remain on the table.

Item No. 0399-10 Proposed Budget Amendment-Chapter CE-99 (Current Expense Budget for F.Y. 1999) Amendment No. 13.

Council Member Hurdle moved that this item be removed from the table. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to be removed from the table.

Mrs. Hurdle explained that this amendment was read in its entirety at the last City Council meeting, and it would help to transfer money to help with the Maryland Municipal League's project for the year 2000. The focal point of the project was a book containing information about government in Maryland cities and towns that would teach children about this. This book would be distributed to private and public schools and libraries, and those municipalities who participated in the project would receive one of the books.

The amount of money transferred by this amendment was \$2,010, and the amendment was reviewed Monday night at the Council workshop meeting. There were no problems,

and everything seemed to be in order. Therefore, Mrs. Hurdle moved that the amendment be approved as presented and adopted. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0).

Item No. 0399-12 Proposed Ordinance No. 99-04-To Enact A New Section 110-75, Schedule XXVII, Entitled "Restricted Weekend Parking," Of Chapter 110 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New Carrollton, Maryland, 1997 Edition Entitled "Vehicles and Traffic" for the Purpose of Restricting Weekend Parking on Certain Streets Except by Permit Parking for Residents as Provided for in Resolution 98-01 of the City Council of the City of New Carrollton, Maryland.

Council Member Schaffer moved that this item be removed from the table. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to be removed from the table.

Mr. Schaffer explained that this was the item mentioned in the public hearing held earlier tonight, and this ordinance would enable the Contract Police Officers and the County Police Officers to enforce the parking restrictions in the area near the Ramada Hotel. Mr. Schaffer briefly reviewed the streets involved, and he moved that this ordinance be approved. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0).

10. NEW BUSINESS.

Item No. 0499-01 Proposed Budget Amendment-Chapter CE-99 (Current Expense Budget for F.Y. 1999) Amendment No. 14.

Council Member Schaffer explained about this amendment, which was not an emergency, regarding funds for five vehicles and an air compressor provided for in the City's budget last year. Since only partial amounts of money were budgeted for last year, the City borrowed \$106,800 so that it can buy the vehicles now. The loan would be paid back over a four-year period, and Mr. Latour stated that there is a 4.6% interest rate on it.

Mr. Schaffer then read the ordinance, and he moved that it be tabled. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to be tabled.

Item No. 0499-02 Proposed Ordinance No. 99-03 To Enact A New Chapter 10 Of The Code Of Ordinances Of The City of New Carrollton, Maryland, 1997 Edition, Entitled "Emergency Preparedness Plan" For The Purpose Of Laying The Groundwork For A Coordinated Response To A Wide Range Of Situations Which Represent Significant Risk To Property, Severe Impacts To The Environment, and Most Importantly, Hazards To Human Health Or Life.

Council Member Potter stated that this document was very lengthy, and she explained that, on the advice of the City Attorney, all of it does not have to be read in. Mrs. Potter clarified that copies of this document would be available at City Hall for anyone wishing to pick up a copy for review.

Mrs. Potter explained that the Council felt that this is something that the City should have, and she briefly read the different items that are under Chapter 10. Mrs. Potter stated that there would be a public hearing on this on April 21, 1999, in the Council chambers. Written testimony would be accepted, and anyone wishing to testify could do so on April 21. Therefore, Mrs. Potter moved that this item be tabled. Council Member Schaffer seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0) to be tabled.

Item No. 0499-03 Ballot Questions For The May 3, 1999, Election.

Council Member Hurdle explained that the Mayor and City Council have been laboring over many questions and thoughts for several months. Mrs. Hurdle stated that she first brought this to the table for discussion, and she suggested that residents watch for a lengthy report on this in the May edition of the New Carrollton Newsletter.

Mrs. Hurdle continued that there were many good questions turned in by her colleagues and herself, and everyone really worked very hard on this. Mrs. Hurdle then read the three questions that were preceded by a preamble and ended with two footnotes that Mr. Latour distributed prior to the meeting. Afterwards, Mrs. Hurdle moved that the proposed ballot questions be prepared for Election Day and placed on the ballot. Council Member Potter seconded the motion.

Council Member Schaffer stated that he understood that the two footnotes would be part of the questions on the ballot, and Chairman Garvey explained that they would be. Mr. Schaffer commented on the wording of the questions, and he suggested that the words "\$1.00 per \$100 assessed value of your real estate property" be added to the first note. This would clarify that this refers to property tax.

Mr. Schaffer then asked if this could be done, and Mr. Latour responded that this was also spread out over personal property as well. That was why Mr. Latour suggested that the wording remain "of assessed property value."

Chairman Garvey stated that he understood that the tax cap had nothing to do with personal property. Mr. Latour suggested that the wording be "\$100 of assessed value of real property." Mr. Schaffer agreed with the Chairman, and he then read the corrected note.

Chairman Garvey stated that he thought that this explanation was too wordy; and he had a problem with the questions, themselves, which he felt were very vague. Mr. Garvey stated that the explanation was written in the Charter; and it should also be in the budget, which he referred to. Mr. Schaffer then read the corrected note regarding Option C again, based on Mr. Garvey's comments; and the Council Members all agreed.

Mr. Schaffer commented that he hoped that this was clear that while option a) points out that each family is currently paying a cost of \$75 for the Contract Officers, if the City goes to option c) there would be an additional \$75 to \$350 per average household. If the City changes to a nine to sixteen man police force, taxes would increase another \$75 up to \$355 depending on the size. This would not include the start-up cost, and Chairman Garvey suggested that the increase be shown in bold type. Mrs. Potter stated that the word "increase" was already there, and it was her suggestion that it appear in bold type. Chairman Garvey pointed out that the word "increase" is in the second sentence of option c).

Chairman Garvey explained that he was undecided of how he would vote on this item because there were two options. A vote in favor of the item would be to ask the residents what they think; and a vote against the item would be not to ask the residents what they think. Mr. Garvey stated that he has always been a supporter of asking the residents what they think, and he brings up the topic of questions for the ballot every year.

The Chairman further explained that he felt that some people are criticizing the City police force for some reason, and every two years the police question comes up. There was a question on the ballot two years ago regarding the need for an additional Contract Police Officer, and Mr. Garvey stated that he felt that New Carrollton was a relatively safe community.

Mr. Garvey then read that question, and he summarized that the results were 306 residents for and 185 against. Mr. Garvey stated that he felt that this was an overwhelming response two years ago in favor of keeping the three Contract Police Officers.

The Chairman continued that Council Member Hurdle brought up the excellent question this year regarding the City's having its own police force, and he briefly explained some of the history behind preparation of the ballot questions. Mr. Garvey discussed the number of police officers needed, and some of the figures involved in a tax increase. The Chairman felt that the County would not be as responsive to calls for service in New Carrollton if the City has its own police force, and he mentioned how calls were handled in some of the neighboring municipalities.

Mr. Garvey stated that the Mayor and at least three of his colleagues are in favor of continuing with the present arrangement with the Contract Police Officers; however, the issue is being presented to the residents. Mr. Garvey agreed that the City should let the residents vote on the issue, but he felt that some of the terms in the questions were misleading. The Chairman stated that he felt that the other Council Members approved of the question; and if the majority voted in favor of the item, he would not be the one to vote against it.

Council Member Schaffer commended the Chairman for presenting an outstanding background explanation of what has been going on in the Council workshops, and he pointed out that in the back of the packet was a list of the cities in this part of the County that do have their own police force. Mr. Schaffer also commended Mr. Latour for preparing this information, and he mentioned that he had personally spoken with some of the mayors of those cities. Mr. Schaffer summarized some of the amounts spent individually for police departments; and he stated that the City of New Carrollton is spending a net of \$260,000, including the grant money returned, out of a budget of 3.3 million dollars, or 8% of the budget, on public safety.

Mr. Schaffer continued to explain that was one reason why we have a lower tax rate than these neighboring cities, and why their crime problem really wasn't any better than ours. Mr. Schaffer agreed with the Chairman that the City should continue with the Contract Police Officers, who are experience and well trained.

At this time, Chairman Garvey stated that he wished to offer an amendment, and he moved that questions a) and b) be eliminated. Therefore, the question remaining on the ballot would be the original question asking if we want out own police force. Mr. Garvey explained that he felt that a) and b) were answered two years ago by the residents, and the morale of the three Contract Police Officers is low. The police are being unjustly criticized. Mr. Garvey also stated that the sentence regarding the cost of \$75 be brought up to the preamble, after New Carrollton. Council Member Schaffer seconded the motion.

Council Member Hurdle stated that she felt that the questions should be left the way they were, and that the many intelligent residents in the City deserve a choice. Many people have been waiting for the questions to appear on the ballot, and they would be able to understand the questions.

Mrs. Hurdle continued to explain that the Council had been working on this for four or five months, and the reason why something like this was being done every two years was because the City and the area have changed. The people have a right to vote on the three

different questions, and they are aware of what is going on in the City. Mrs. Hurdle summarized that she did not like the Chairman's amendment; and therefore, she would not vote on it.

Chairman Garvey explained that his motion was misunderstood because a) and b) had nothing to do with the residents' spending money for their own police force. At the town meeting with Prince George's County Police Chief John Farrell, the residents were asked if they would pay 30 cents more on their tax rate for a police department. Out of the 60 people in the audience, only 6 residents raised their hand, or 10%.

Mr. Garvey stated that if the residents want a police department, he would work hard to see that they get it. The City of New Carrollton presently has back door trash pick up and emergency snow removal because that is what the residents want. There were five people at the table who did not want a police force, and those five people also did not want to get rid of the three Contract Police Officers. Mr. Garvey stated that he did not want to confuse the issue; however, he would like to find out what the people wanted.

Council Member Fippin agreed with the Chairman that b) should be removed; however, he suggested that a) and c) remain. Mr. Fippin explained that if item c) were approved he would have to put his house on the market, and he relied on the three Contract Police Officers. Mr. Fippin stated that the officers were doing a fine job, and he was happy staying with the current arrangement.

Council Member Potter explained that she was the one who submitted those questions; and when she brought them in as requested, she did not have the correct figures. The questions were sent to the City Accountant for this, and Mrs. Potter explained that at the time her questions were submitted to the Council, she was not in favor of a) and b). Mrs. Potter stated that she agreed with Mr. Fippin that a) and c) remain, and question b) be removed; and she explained that she was in favor of keeping the three contract police officers two years ago. Mrs. Potter would not like to live in this City without them.

Council Member Hurdle explained that she submitted five different proposals, which were also sent to the City Accountant; and the Accountant did not find anything wrong with Mrs. Hurdle's questions. Mrs. Hurdle stated that she felt that the City was not getting its money's worth from the three Contract Police Officers, because we never know what they are doing. Mrs. Hurdle stated that in regard to safety she wanted accountability and visibility because she has noticed many more children in the City during the past few years. Mrs. Hurdle did not feel that it was fair to make the children get off of their sidewalks and streets because people are speeding and running stop signs.

Mrs. Hurdle explained that the area has changed, and the officers need to use a "hands on" policy, and this would require them to be out on the streets talking to the children and residents. Mrs. Hurdle stated that the three Contract Police Officers did not act unless the Mayor told them to do so. Mrs. Hurdle stated that she was not criticizing the police because her son had worked very hard to become a police lieutenant. Mrs. Hurdle asked Mr. Garvey what he was afraid of, and she stated that all three questions should be on the ballot so that the residents could decide what they wanted.

Chairman Garvey responded that he was not afraid of putting the three questions on the ballot; and furthermore, he explained that if there were problems with the three Contract Police Officers, they should be addressed separately.

Council Member Hurdle mentioned the meeting with Captain Hylton in Hyattsville, and she stated that the captain did not like the tone of an article a resident had written for a local newspaper.

Mrs. Hurdle again stated that she felt that the three questions needed to be on the ballot to give the residents a chance to answer them, despite whatever any of her colleagues sitting here tonight thought. Mrs. Hurdle explained that there should not have to be incidents before the police are asked to patrol certain areas, and she again asked the Chairman and her colleagues to approve the three questions for the ballot.

Chairman Garvey asked why this topic comes up every two years, and Council Member Hurdle responded that it does not make any difference if it makes sense. Mr. Garvey suggested that the reason might be that Mrs. Hurdle runs for office every two years.

Council Member Hurdle stated that the Chairman's statement was a joke, and she accused the Chairman of thinking of her as a joke. Chairman Garvey responded that he did not think of Mrs. Hurdle as a joke; however, Mrs. Hurdle stated that he did, and the residents might just as well know it. Mrs. Hurdle accused Mr. Garvey of being a very rude man. Mr. Garvey responded that he did know what he had ever done to make Mrs. Hurdle dislike him so much; and Mrs. Hurdle responded that she thought it was reverse, and Mr. Garvey disliked her.

Council Member Schaffer then made a point of order with a summary of what was happening at this time in the meeting. Chairman Garvey had made an amendment to strike a) and b) and leave question c) regarding a police force on the ballot. Mr. Schaffer explained that he seconded this motion to make sure it got discussed, and not because he was in favor of it.

Mr. Schaffer stated that one argument for leaving all three questions on the ballot was that the residents could not say they were not given the same option as the residents of College Park, who voted on whether they wanted to have their own police department. Mr. Schaffer spoke briefly about how he thought the residents would answer the questions on the ballot, and he also reviewed his original brief questions of whether the residents wanted "less, the same, or a great deal more in regard to public safety."

At this time, Council Member Potter pointed out to Mr. Schaffer some important information. If there are three questions on the ballot, the residents could only vote for one. If the residents chose anything other than question c), they would not be telling the Council that they would like to have a police force, which was the original question that Mrs. Hurdle brought to the table.

Council Member Schaffer agreed, and he again reviewed some of the history surrounding this issue. Mr. Schaffer stated that he felt that the morale of the three Contract Police Officers would go "sky high" with a vote of confidence if the outcome of the ballot question was that the residents wished to keep them.

Chairman Garvey responded that the way people would vote should never be predicted. Mr. Garvey again stated that the morale of the three Contract Police Officers is down now, and for the next month, they would be thinking that the City might get rid of them. Normally, issues that the Council Members were all in favor of, such as the renovation of the Public Works building, were put on the ballot.

Chairman Garvey then called for a vote on his amendment, and Council Member Fippin asked if the Council Members could vote individually. The Chairman responded that they could, and the results were: Chairman Garvey – for; Council Member Fippin – against, Council Member Hurdle – against, Council Member Potter – against; Council Member Schaffer – against. Therefore, the amendment was defeated (1-4).

Chairman Garvey made a second amendment that question b) be eliminated, and questions a) and c) remain for the ballot. Council Member Fippin seconded the motion. Council Member Hurdle still felt that all three questions should remain. The Chairman called for the vote on this amendment, and it was approved (3-2), with Mrs. Hurdle and Mr. Schaffer voting against it.

The Chairman then read the entire questions for the ballot again for clarification, and he explained that item c) would become item b) because the original b) had been eliminated.

The Chairman announced that there would be a short break at approximately 10:00 p.m.

After the videotape was changed, Chairman Garvey announced that the Council was back in session.

The Chairman asked each Council Member individually if there were any other questions they wished to place on the ballot for the May 3 election, and there were no other questions. Mr. Garvey explained that the reason why he did this was because that this was the last night it could be done.

Item No. 0499-04 Request for Extension of Time Before Towing Vehicle From Ossie Adams, 6403 Jodie Street.

Council Member Fippin explained that this vehicle was in need of tags, and the owner was waiting for the car to pass inspection. The resident had requested an extension until April 15, and the Code Enforcement department agreed. Therefore, Mr. Fippin moved that this extension be granted. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

Item No. 0499-05 Request for Extension of Time Before Towing Vehicle From Matiar Rahman, 6516 Jodie Street.

Council Member Schaffer explained that this car had expired D. C. tags, and it was parked in the resident's driveway. Code Enforcement recommended a 30-day extension, and Mr. Schaffer explained that the new tags must be from the State of Maryland. The reason for this is that the City of New Carrollton receives financial benefit from the State for all vehicles registered with the State and domiciled in the City of New Carrollton. Mr. Schaffer then moved that a 30-day extension be granted. Council Member Hurdle seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

Item No. 0499-06 Request for Extension of Time Before Towing Vehicle From Samuel Clover, Jr., 8121 Powhatan Street.

Council Member Potter explained that this vehicle was in need of current tags; and in order for this to happen, the car would have to be fully operational. Otherwise, the resident would need to make arrangements for the car to be picked up by a charitable organization. Therefore, Mrs. Potter moved that a 30-day extension be granted until May 7. Council Member Fippin seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.

Item No. 0499-07 Letter to Commend Principal Rise Gaines of Carrollton Elementary School.

Council Member Schaffer stated that this is the item that he added to the agenda tonight at the beginning of the meeting. Mr. Schaffer recommended that the Mayor and/or the Council send a congratulatory letter to the Board of Education commending Principal Rise Gaines for the excellent job she has been doing. Mr. Schaffer then read a draft of a letter he had written, and he explained that he would give this to Mr. Latour tomorrow.

Mr. Schaffer presented several examples of why he felt that Principal Gaines was doing an outstanding job at Carrollton Elementary School, and he stated that morale among the teachers at the school was high. Children are being brought up to a new learning level because many who enter kindergarten do not know their letters or even how to spell their names. There is a "Drop (Everything) and Read" program every morning at 8:15 a.m., and everywhere in the school children are busy learning in the classrooms. Mr. Schaffer recommended that Ms. Gaines be eligible for any future awards offered, either locally or nationally because she is such an outstanding administrator and educator.

Mayor Hanko stated that he would use Mr. Schaffer's draft to prepare the letter, and Chairman Garvey suggested that Mr. Schaffer present the letter, signed by the Mayor, in person to the Board of Education. Mr. Schaffer responded that this was a good idea, and he then moved that this letter be prepared. Council Member Potter seconded the motion.

Mrs. Potter stated that Doctors Community Hospital and the Prince George's Little Theatre had given Ms. Gaines tickets to use as incentive awards for the students of Carrollton Elementary this past December for the Christmas show. Prince George's Little Theatre would be performing "The Emperor's New Clothes" in June, and 50 tickets would be given to the school by the Prince George's Little Theatre, separately from Doctors Community Hospital.

Students would be able to attend the Friday and Saturday evenings shows as well as the Sunday matinee, and Ms. Gaines usually worked out a way to get the students to the show. Mrs. Potter agreed with Mr. Schaffer that Ms. Gaines had some really innovative programs at Carrollton Elementary, and she explained that Ms. Gaines did not know about the June tickets yet. Chairman Garvey called for the vote, and the motion was unanimously approved (5-0).

Item No. 0499-08 Substance Abuse Prevention Program Grant Application.

Council Member Fippin explained about this grant that would enable a program to be initiated by the City of New Carrollton working with the Prince George's County Public School system. An alliance would be established in order to identify six to eight eighth graders in the City of New Carrollton who might be at risk for substance abuse. There

would be a comprehensive substance abuse program providing practical tools for avoiding substance abuse and six interactive workshops. Mr. Fippin explained about some of topics to be discussed, and he also stated that there would be an outdoors weekend workshop focusing on teamwork and outdoor skills. Mr. Fippin stated that the amount of this grant was \$4,600, and the City would need to provide matching funds of \$553. The grant needs to be submitted to Baltimore by April 19; and therefore, Mr. Fippin moved that the application for the grant be approved. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved (5-0).

**11. SUSPENSION OF THE RULES IN ORDER TO HEAR FROM CITIZENS
- 10 MINUTE LIMIT.**

A. AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION.

There was no audience participation at this time.

B. TELEPHONE PARTICIPATION.

Ms. Jo Oliver, 8310 Nicholson Street, telephoned to express her comments regarding the ballot questions on police issues presented tonight. Ms. Oliver expressed her disapproval of the Council's action tonight, which she felt overrode the people because the questions were designed to frighten them. Ms. Oliver stated that she felt that this was outlandish and not fair; and furthermore, she explained that she intended to boycott this year's City election because those running were uncontested.

Ms. Oliver urged the Council "to stop lying to people" because this was not fair, and she stated that she felt that this was one of the reasons why so many people did not vote and were leaving the City. Ms. Oliver summarized that she would write to the local newspapers about this issue. Chairman Garvey thanked the resident for her comments tonight.

Council Member Schaffer responded to Ms. Oliver's comments that in the State of California, six cities cancelled their elections because there was not enough interest and only 10% of the registered voters showed up

Mr. Mitchell, 6004 Mentana Street, telephoned to compliment the Mayor and Council for the work that they do for the City. Mr. Mitchell explained that he was not in favor of paying additional taxes in order for the City to have its own police force. Since the City is already getting police protection from Prince George's County, he felt that a police force would be a "double deal." Mr. Mitchell felt he was already paying enough taxes.

Mr. Mitchell stated that he felt that the three Contract Police Officers were doing the best that they could for the City, and that there are many people who do not have any respect for the law. Those people would continue speeding and running stop signs no matter how many police the City had. The government needs to change by raising the fines for violations and by stop protecting the violators. Mr. Mitchell concluded by stating that things were not like they were 30 years ago. Chairman Garvey thanked the resident for his comments tonight.

Mr. Gerry Storer, 5915 Mentana Street, telephoned to comment about the police issue, and he explained that he had been a resident of the City since 1962. Mr. Storer approved of the job done by the Mayor and the Council Members, and he stated that he saw the three Contract Police Officers on the streets often.

Mr. Storer suggested an alternative idea for public safety, and that was to make New Carrollton a gated community. Mr. Storer summarized that he was satisfied with the three Contract Police Officers, and Chairman Garvey thanked the resident for his comments tonight.

At this time, Chairman Garvey asked the Council when the meeting to explain the ballot questions to the residents should be, and the Council agreed that the meeting would be held on Wednesday, April 28, in the multi-purpose room. The Mayor stated that the sound system in the room would be improved.

12. ADJOURNMENT.

Council Member Fippin moved that the Council meeting be adjourned. Council Member Potter seconded the motion, and it was unanimously (5-0) approved.
